## A failed coup, people power in Iran and pages of inspiration

It's been a seismic year for news in Europe but one of the oddest stories came last week when 25 conspirators were arrested in Germany, accused of plotting to overthrow the government. The eclectic grouping, known as the Reichsbürger plotters, espoused a far-right ideology but hailed largely from the centre of respectable German society, headed up by an elderly minor aristocrat and including family doctors, judges, a celebrity chef and an opera singer.

Berlin bureau chief Philip Oltermann asks how far the plotters might seriously have got and what it all means for Germany. And columnist Jonathan Freedland argues that the case is more evidence that the greatest terror threat facing the world no longer comes from radical Islam, but the white far-right.
