Two natural disasters, Blair's global vision and Britain's love of cheese

Two separate natural disasters in north Africa have dominated the news this month. But while Moroccan emergency responses to an earthquake that killed around 3,000 people seemed quick and efficient, it appeared in sharp contrast to the chaos at the deluged Libyan port of Derna, where many thousands more lost their lives after a double dam burst in the wake of Storm Daniel.

As huge logistical and administrative challenges prevented assistance from reaching Derna, Kaamil Ahmed hears the testimonies of several local Libyan journalists who witnessed scenes they are still struggling to process.
