Escalating events in Israel and Gaza continued to cause deep distress and alarm, with several thousand people known to be dead or wounded on either side of the border. US president Joe Biden was expected to visit the country this week, amid growing expectations of an Israeli ground invasion and fears of a wider regional escalation.

With the situation still in flux, Guardian and Observer correspondents have pieced together an extended account of the horrifying events that took place during the first week of a conflict that shook the world and may permanently shift the diplomacy of the Middle East.
