## *Israel-Gaza spirals, Russia recruits Serbs, and the Stones roll on*

As events in Gaza continue to dominate headlines, we focus this week on the frantic diplomatic efforts to prevent the crisis from spiralling into a wider global conflict. Jason Burke traces the possible route to a wider war or, in the other direction, to at least a pause in hostilities.

Elsewhere, Ruth Michaelson hears from terrified Gazans who have been pushed south, while Emma Graham-Harrison and Julian Borger consider the likely consequences of a "victorious" Israeli ground offensive.
